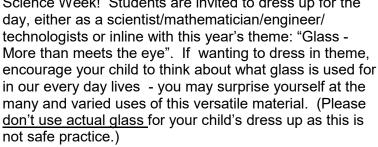

From your School Counsellor.....Miss Jo. Raising Resilient Children!

Helping children learn to deal with their emotions is an important task. All children experience periods of stress in their lives and need the emotional skills to deal with it. Children's emotional resilience or ability to cope with their feelings is important to their longterm happiness, wellbeing and success in life. Seminar Series Tip Sheets identify emotional resilience involves teaching these six key skills:

- ◆ Recognising, understanding and accepting different feelings,
- Expressing feelings appropriately,
- ◆ Developing a positive outlook, including being optimistic, interested in a variety of things and being content,
- Developing effective ways of coping,
- Acknowledging and dealing with negative feelings and unpleasant situations,
- ◆ Learning to manage stressful life events.

When children become emotionally resilient there are many benefits for them. They are more likely to be:

- ◆Caring and socially skilled,
- ♦ Empathic and sensitive to the needs of others,
- ♦ Able to manage emotions and move through negative feelings to feel better again.
- ♦ Able to cope with stress, like exams and unpleasant experiences like painful medical procedures in the future.

Children are also less likely to resort to unhelpful ways of coping, such as:

- Acting out or misbehaving,
- ♦ Avoiding or denying a problem,
- ♦ Relying on others to solve their problems or,
- ♦ Seeking lots of sympathy from their care givers.

At our Kindergarten we really value the benefits of nature play and the learning that our natural environment has to offer. Our Kindy

garden project has strengthened over the past few years, with the children enjoying 'being farmers' and caring for our growing vegies and herbs – and most importantly – tasting the produce straight from the garden, or creating yummy food with them! This year our garden goal is to begin to create a seed bank, and this is coming along really well with our collection including dragon fruit and passionfruit seeds.

This term we focused on National Tree Day on a smaller scale. We used this event to focus on our natural environment a little

more; exploring and naming the different parts we could see in leaves, plants and their

roots, and engaging in nature scavenger hunts to really appreciate all that our Kinder garden has to offer. We collected nature items and used them in our play – to pattern, sort and decorate, and then to try to

create the letters of the alphabet.

To extend on our garden goals we also planted sunflower seeds. Each child planted their own seeds, and watched as they sprouted. We planned on creating a poster as a group for the children to document the plants' growth, however our clever kinder children noted quickly that all of their plants were different in height. With this observation, each child then created a poster of their own plants; observing,

measuring and documenting. Our learning involved all of our Kindergarten Curriculum areas of Identity, Connection, Wellbeing, Active Learning and Communication – which covers language, literacy and numeracy. When our sunflower plants go to seed we will collect these for our seed bank!
