Keeping our children safe online

Our children are living in a digital age and as they increasingly use online applications to learn, interact, play, and engage, they are **developing an understanding** of the world around them at a

rate that is exponentially faster than in previous years. With these advances comes a greater risk of being exposed to content that surpasses their developmental needs and understanding. The <u>esafety commission</u> reports, that nearly half of 9-16 years olds experience regular exposure to inappropriate content online through accidental and purposeful means. **St John's School is committed to keeping our children safe online** and all learning applications in use at school or suggested at home by the school, have been thoroughly vetted by our online policies and procedures.

When **accessing content online at home**, the initial issue arises when using search engines on social media, gaming platforms, Youtube or even Google. **Children often search innocent topics and yet** mistakenly, can be lead down a path of videos, chats, images, articles, and other content that may be violent, inappropriate, explicit, and/or harmful. Children can become confused, scared, shocked, or sometimes intrigued, which are all normal reactions. This **can be prevented by activating the 'safe search filter'** which limits search results to child-friendly images and content.

The second issue is that once this **inappropriate content is found**, either by accidental or purposeful means, the device or application begins to create an algorithm for your child's preferences and displays similar content, at an alarming rate. One video viewed of their favourite Youtuber or movie character, may result in similar yet more disturbing content and place your child at an increased risk of viewing harmful content when next online.

The answer is **not** to remove all access to online platforms, as children require these provisions for their learning and development in the modern world we live, **but rather to engage in <u>conversations</u> with your children** around online safety and to access assistance if your child has viewed content that has negatively impacted them.

The esafety commissioner website has a wealth of information for parents and children regarding online safety and recommends the use of <u>Parental controls</u>. <u>https://www.esafety.gov.au/parents/issues-and-advice/parental-controls</u>

They can be set up to do things like:

- **Block** your child from accessing specific websites, apps or functions (like using a device's camera, or the ability to buy things).
- **Filter** different kinds of content such as 'adult' or sexual content, content that may promote self-harm, eating disorders, violence, drugs, gambling, racism, and terrorism.

• Allow you to **monitor** your child's use of connected devices, with reports on the sites they visit and the apps they use, how often and for how long.

• Set **time limits**, blocking access after a set time.

If a device or program is shared by multiple members of your family, you should be able change the tool settings to reflect each user's age and skills. If you require further assistance the <u>Kidshelpline</u>, **Community Support Centre Innisfail**, and <u>esafety websites</u> have an extensive amount of information for both children and families.
